And Now the Monthly Report

A month ago, we were part way across the Atlantic on the leg from Cascais, Portugal to Havana, Cuba and were in 2nd place. A week from the end of the race, we had a bad 36 hours when we were going nowhere and all the others kept moving. At this time, we briefly lost 2nd place to London Clipper. However, as our courses converged, we were able to get ahead of them. Over the final week, we gradually ate in to New York Clipper's lead and extended our advantage on London and Hong Kong close behind, so we finished in 2nd place. Collecting our 2nd place pennant at the prize giving was a great moment.

Old Havana has a mix of colonial buildings, some of which have been renovated and look splendid whilst others are falling down but still inhabited.

On the Wednesday, Bristol Clipper took a mix of English and Cuban staff from the British embassy out for a sail, whilst in the evening, all the crews were invited to a reception at the British Ambassador's residence; a rare insight in to a different world!

On the Thursday, we re-enacted the 1762 invasion of Havana by taking 7 of the Clippers in to Havana itself; since the rest of the time we were based at Marina Hemingway, 8 miles to the West. The entrance to Havana harbour is quite narrow, but then opens out once inside. The entrance is guarded by an old fort, Castillo Del Morro. We motored in, in formation, and moored up for a while, before heading back out and home. Since it was downwind through the entrance channel, a couple of the Clippers, Bristol and London, broke away from the formation to fly spinnakers out through the entrance, Bristol in front and London at the rear. Apparently it was splendid sight and it was great fun to do.

The start of Race 3 wasn't a good day for me since I had a seafood pizza on the Friday night and all the unpleasant symptoms of food poisoning on the Saturday (start) morning. However, the doctor came up with some wacky drugs and I was able to rejoin Bristol Clipper just before leaving Immigration for the start. We had a brilliant start along with Jersey and Liverpool and passed the first mark in 2nd place overtaking Liverpool on the mark rounding. Sadly, after that, it went downhill, at least partly because I was dying in my bunk. At the 0400 sched, we were in 5th place with Glasgow close behind. During the night, the wind came round and we were able to fly a spinnaker for a while, before just as we passed the western end of Cuba, the wind came round and we were close hauled again, with a fairly light breeze.

Then, it all turned in to a bit of a lottery, as the weather was very squally and often, two boats only a mile apart would come out of a squall completely differently; sometimes gaining or losing up to 5 miles! Glasgow found their way ahead of us, so we were then in 6th place for a few days.

Towards the end of the race, the fleet had all bunched up so that the distance from front to back of the whole fleet was only 31 miles. Bristol had taken 5th place by a whisker from Hong Kong. The wind held up for the last 24 hours of the race, so it was bit of a procession in. No opportunities for big position changes, though by the 0400 sched Hong Kong at 94 miles from the finish was about 1 mile ahead of us and about 6 miles away on the beam, with their tricolour in view.

The closer we got to the finish, the closer we came to Hong Kong so that 10 miles from the finish, they were a few hundred yards, slightly ahead on our windward side; not a good place to overtake from. However, about 5 miles from the finish, we worked our way to their windward side a few boat lengths away and after a short luffing match, where they tried to head us upwind, we were just about through to windward. Sadly, at this point, we got a riding turn on the spinnaker winch (where the tail of the sheet is caught under the active part and it can't be trimmed or eased). The spinnaker collapsed while we were sorting it and Hong Kong escaped our clutches. However, they then sailed deeper downwind whilst we headed straight for the nearest end of the line, going faster towards the line and we were soon ahead. Realising their error, they tried to get upwind of us in the last few minutes, but were unable to catch us and crossed the line 1 minute 8 seconds behind.

This was an awesome end to what to us has been a disappointing race. Regaining 5th place like this really was a fantastic way to end. Also, this wasn't just a fight for this race. It was also a fight for 3rd place, so far, in Clipper 2002 overall. Jersey are in the lead with 20 points, London have 16 and we have 15 points.

We are now waiting for a passage through the Panama Canal, which should be in the morning, Christmas Eve, so that we are in Panama for Christmas. It's very much a waiting game, since the large ships take priority.

What an amazing year 2002 has been. I first sailed on Bristol Clipper, just out of refit, in early April, when the log read 1.8 nautical miles. It now reads 12359.5 miles and I have been aboard for all except about 500 miles of it! We've sailed from an autumnal UK, across the Atlantic to the heat of the Caribbean. Apparently, it's Christmas in two days time and there are decorations about, but Christmas in this heat seems totally incongruous!

That's it for this month.

WHY SAIL THE WINTER SERIES?



We were all wondering why we bother when the sky was grey and the wind bitter. We were very reluctant to set out on 8th December, but the OD was there bright and early and the race started before some of the boats reached the line. The course looked rather long - a beat out to 8 and a bit one-sided at that. I was seriously debating whether to bother after a particularly bad start. Then, part-way to M, I saw a bit of a shadow over my shoulder. I thought "Oh no, someone's coming up to overtake", but it wasn't Mike Clarke, it was a dolphin! Estimates vary as to how many there were. Robin said he thought there were 25, they kept leaping in and out so much but I think 6 or 7 was nearer the mark. They played with each boat as it reached down to 1, in and out of the bow wave. It brought back memories of summer flotillas in Greece and

immediately made it all seem worthwhile. As we went past the committee boat Brian's instructions to his AOD were interrupted by each helm in turn shouting at him about the dolphins. I don't think anyone cared too much about the results, you can't shout starboard on a dolphin. It was amazing how close they came and we were worried about hurting them. They look very big when they leap out just beside you when you're sitting on a Laser. When there is a dolphin either side of the bow we discovered a curious effect on the hydrodynamics which I'm sure some technical guru could explain but basically when you're on a screaming plane, the bow goes not up, but down, and you quickly submarine and fill with water. In a Laser this slams the self-bailer shut and it took most of the next beat to dry out. But who cares! It was one of the best races I have ever had.

SECURITY

With the move to the new site complete the question of security is now of paramount importance. It is impossible to stop a determined thief but simple precautions will certainly make things very difficult for them. Every step has been taken to ensure security with our alarm system and cameras but members can also help further in the safety of the Clubhouse and the site.

LOCKING THE GATES AND CLUBHOUSE DOORS

Always ensure that you **lock the Clubhouse doors and windows when you are the last person to leave**. A quick look round and a hearty shout please to ensure you are the last person before closing and securely locking the doors.

All gates should be locked if there is nobody else on site even if the gates are open when you arrive. It is important that the lock to the hardstanding is put through two links of the chain and not through the copper shackle which secures the padlock to the chain. If there is another Club member or members still on site tell them you are leaving and a reminder to them to lock up when they leave.

The changing rooms are vulnerable so once again keep them locked and do not leave valuables in the changing room.

DINGHY AND KEEL BOATS

If you do not need equipment on your boat take it home where it will be safe.

If you have a cover ensure that is secure and tied. The same with your boat, it should always be securely tied to 'tie downs'. More damage is caused to boats on a hardstanding than on the water!

Ensure you have your boat number clearly visible and that your trolley and trailer is clearly marked with your name and boat number. This will enable contact to be made with you should it become necessary.

NON-MEMBERS ON SITE

Remember that the site is private and should we find non-members on site we should always speak to them and determine their reason for being there. A large number of our neighbours have used the site for years and although supportive of ourselves still feel a little grieved that they have lost access. Treat everybody with civility when pointing out that it is private property and if you consider that their presence is not detrimental to security then allow a little leeway to the 'trespass'.

This is also an opportunity to push the Club hard and to recruit new members, especially with the younger group who could be told of what we can offer and how we can teach them to sail. Please get them on 'our side'.

INCIDENT BOOK

If an incident occurs that you consider should be brought to notice please make an entry in the Incident Book which can be found just inside the main door.

KEYS

Keys are extremely important and every member should have a key. This might mean purchasing others but it is important that everybody should be able to lock up after them. Too often doors are left unlocked because members have forgotten their keys or another member of the family has them. Keys are inexpensive when you consider what we (you) might lose because you were unable to lock up!

FINALLY

Don't get into an argument if somebody is 'lippy' or causing you grief - it is an unfortunate fact of life that if you get involved you may not get the support from the law which you might expect. However if the incident is such that you feel that it is necessary to call the Police then do so right way. Do not put yourself at risk in any way whatsoever.

Buy your extra keys - lock up and enjoy yourselves
