FROM THE HONORARY SECRETARY

Castle Cove Sailing Club Rules

The CCSC rules (in your Handbook) are being reviewed for a number of reasons:

- 1. Currently rules relating to the constitution of the Club are integrated with those to do with Club management. These need to be separated.
- 2. Last year rule changes that were designed to make sense of our new location were debated at the AGM with no opportunity for careful evaluation of proposed changes.
- 3. The Committee is clear in its' purpose of maintaining the friendly, family ethos of the Club; however our new site has brought new and unforeseen demands, (e.g. extensive requests for national regattas etc.). The purpose of the Committee should be to manage the Club on a day-to-day basis, including being able to put in place sensible bylaws to ensure the Club is run safely and for the benefit of all members.
- 4. To bring CCSC rules and bylaws into closer alignment with RYA recommendations (available on their website)
- 5. Eradication of this year's Handbook errors.

This note is to forewarn everyone of the process for reviewing the rules. I propose to:

- a) Separate the rules into two sections 1) relating to the Club's constitution that may only be amended by the full membership at AGMs or EGMs and 2) bylaws that concern Club management that may be introduced or amended by the General Committee.
- b) Introduce new bylaws to cover security and the safe and lawful use of Club resources.

Herewith the timetable:

3 June	Draft 1 proposed rules discussed at General Committee
1 July	Draft 2 proposed rules circulated to members with July newsletter
5 September	<i>Final date for members' comments regarding draft proposed rules</i>
12 September	Draft 3 Proposed rules circulated to General Committee, Hon Solicitor and panel
7 October	General Committee confirms proposed rules
By 17 October	Proposed rules circulated to members
7 November	General Committee presents proposed rules with explanations as necessary
7 November	General Committee presents proposed rules with explanations as necessary AGM votes on proposed rules

All members will therefore have 2 months in which to review and comment on the proposed rules. One plea, for my sanity, if everyone waits until 5 September to write their recommendations I shall disappear under the cloud of paper, especially as I shall be dealing with the 5 year renewal of the Club Licence at the same time.

We must also do the same with all the lockable gates at the site. We have already had an outboard motor stolen from one of the Club Rescue Boats. There are people around looking for opportunities - don't give them to them.

CLUB DINGHIES

The Club invested in dinghies to give new members the chance to try before buying and to enable members to use another boat occasionally. The cost of maintaining these has been far in excess of receipts for use, so we have to restrict use to general sailing sessions where there is safety boat cover and advice on rigging.

Boats

There are 2 Lasers, 3 Toppers, 1 Mirror and 1 Optimist, which will now be locked; Committee members will have keys and collect fees. The same reminders apply:-

- Users must be capable of handling the boat in those weather conditions.
- Has anyone else booked the boat for this time?
- Rigging should be checked by a competent person if the user is unsure.

Boats must return to shore when racing or other sessions finish. Equipment must be returned to the store and the boat secured, with any defects entered on the board in the store. Please also notify the appropriate carer if possible.

Fees per half day apply, except no charge is made for Saturday morning Cadet sessions.

Laser and Mirror £5; Topper and Optimist £3

If a boat is badly damaged through lack of care, the Club may seek a contribution to the insurance excess.

Bookings can be made in a diary on the Chart Room notice board up to one week in advance. Bookings cannot be made for Saturday morning Cadet sessions, when boats are allocated according to demand.

These were the questions asked of the public to tempt them down to CASTLE COVE SAILING CLUB'S FIRST – OPEN DAY 11 MAY 2003



Following the move to our new site, it was decided to hold an Open Day on 11 May. The day was principally aimed at attracting new members to the Club, but it also was an opportunity to show the local community how work has progressed on the site, to talk about the future and to reassure them that all ongoing work would improve the area. The marketing plan for the day was firmly in place – but as Roy said in his briefing before the start – we could see 5 or 5,000 come through today but we were blessed with a lovely sunny day and light winds and what better place for us to be – apart from on the water.

All the Class Captains came and put up displays and were available to talk to people about the Club and the Clubhouse looked stunning. We even had an Oppie in the centre of the Club, with a harness hanging from the roof for youngsters to try out a trapeze. A couple of stands had videos of people sailing and it was even possible for people to go out on a jaunt around the harbour on a couple of keelboats and a Wayfarer, which many did. The delight on the children's faces that had never been on a sailing boat before had to be seen to be believed - we certainly made many new friends on the day. Coastwatch had a representative and a stand and WOEC came along - so, if people had no sailing experience, they were able to talk about their beginners' sailing courses. The Social Committee did sterling work, serving free teas, coffees and biscuits to the visitors, as well as keeping the 'workers' going with hot drinks and sarnies. From lunchtime onwards, Mike and Robyn Abbott pulled many a pint to oil the wheels of communication.

A huge thank you goes to everyone involved for making the day such a success. Eighty-seven groups of people came in through the doors of the Club on the day, representing about 250 people in the area who may be interested in joining the Club and sailing with us. The Mayor came, as did Councillors Hazel Priest, Kay Wilcox, Samantha Baird, Lynne Herbert, Peter Farrell and Nigel Reid along with Richard Burgess, Director of Environmental Services - all were delighted with the work and so pleased that the Club is making such an asset of the site for itself and the wider community. At the latest count, 20 new memberships have resulted from the day and, as the Communications Group had set itself an informal target of 10 new memberships, the day far exceeded our expectations.

Only three of us started on a windy Friday evening with the wind coming straight from Alderney!! A quick discussion over the radio and we agreed to change the course to Cherbourg. Apologies to the boat that followed on later in the weekend expecting to see us in Alderney. Stand Easy, with a lightweight crew and two of them feeling worse for wear in a very uncomfortable sea sensibly decided to return to Weymouth while Iduna and Harmony carried on to Cherbourg. Having bought up the Hypermarket and enjoyed another superb meal in the Grand Gousier we returned to Weymouth on Sunday yet again sailing the whole way. The next passage race in June is to Poole – a great first passage race – not too far and very sociable. We have been invited to join in with Poole YC's BBQ on the Saturday night which should be good fun. Please let me know if you are thinking of going and I can book a berth at Poole YC for you. Watch the Z Class Notice Board for details.

The cruising season is also well underway. Seraphim is away for two weeks – Brittany and the Channel Islands I think, Satsuma has left for two or three months and Canopus is leading a cruise in company to the Channel Islands at the moment. Owaissa took a long weekend to Cherbourg and Alderney and by the absence of boats in the Harbour and on the moorings I guess many others are away. FROM BRISTOL CLIPPER

The last month has passed incredibly quickly.

In the race from San Fernando to Singapore, we maintained the lead for virtually the whole race. The course was set to pass through a number of gates so that when the wind went very light, the race could be shortened at one of the gates. This is because the winds in the South China Sea can be very light at this time of year and we could have been drifting for days.

One night, as we passed down the coast of Sabah, with Jersey just behind, a couple of Clippers behind, but further inshore, Glasgow and Hong Kong, did better out of a couple of squalls and caught up and overtook us. Thus, they were ahead at the next gate, with Hong Kong first, Glasgow second, us third and Jersey fourth. The race was shortened to this gate so our third through it was our finishing place. Having led for so long, this was a disappointment, but with Jersey behind, we reduced their margin on first place to 6 points and increased our margin on third place to 9 points, so it was a good result.

Nongsa Point Marina and the Turi Beach Resort in Batam were fantastic, really relaxing. The resort consists of airconditioned huts on stilts, on a hillside above the restaurant and pool (with its own sunken bar). Most people went for a day or two to Singapore for the high life and shopping.

Ten days ago, we set off, firstly for another 4 days under power to Selat Sunda south of Java where we started the next race to Mauritius. On the way, we crossed the equator again. It was very calm, so as we reached the line (which is quite clearly marked in the water), we slowed right down and some of the crew jumped in and swam across. Since there was a northbound current, we then drifted back across the line before heading south again. In all, I think we crossed the line 5 times and most of us swam one way or the other!



The other Clippers with us were all doing the same sort of thing and King Neptune came to visit several of the yachts. However, there was a bit of a run on bookings this morning, and we had booked late, so he only came to see us at 5pm this afternoon. We had 3 equator virgins with us, Clive, Gill and Dr Richard who were tried, found guilty and punished for various crimes, with slops (which had been fermenting all day) ladled over various parts of their anatomy, head, shoulders, down the shorts. Neptune was assisted by his trusty lieutenants, Yin (Chuckster) and Yang (Vicky), who read out the crimes and implemented Neptune's chosen punishment. The most serious punishment was reserved for Dr Richard who tried to claim he had been on board so long he had already crossed the equator. He had the remaining half of the slops poured all over him for this.

We have now been racing for a week and have been in the lead on every 12 hourly radio sched bar one, albeit by only one to three miles each time. The racing remains very close and after 1300 miles racing, there is only 27 miles from front to back of the fleet. The race started off quite light and we were making a course of little better than South to keep the apparent wind up in the light easterly winds. As we have got further south, the wind has gradually picked up and we are now trucking along in the trade winds, heading on course at nine to ten knots. In the whole race, we have been on the same tack/gybe the whole time except for two minutes under a rain cloud.

We've still got 1635 miles to go to Mauritius which should take us about 8 days.

Our current position is 17S 86E, so we have sailed three quarters of the way round the globe since we left Liverpool!
