EXTERNAL SITE WORK

Work parties are continuing but YOUR HELP IS ESPECIALLY NEEDED! 1ST/2ND AND 15TH/16TH MARCH

Many of you will know just how much hard work has been put in on Sunday mornings this year. We are trying to make the best of use of favourable tides on the weekends of 1st/2nd March and 15th/16th March.

We are intending to work on the Saturday morning as well on those weekends. There is concrete to be mixed and sandbags to fill to plug more of the holes in the retaining wall. Also, we are hiring a pressure washer to clean off the slipways. To make the most of the cost involved and take advantage of the tide we need to set up a rota to use it all weekend 1^{st} and 2^{nd} March – both morning and afternoon. WEYMOUTH OUTDOOR EDUCATION CENTRE

Weymouth Outdoor Education Centre (WOEC) run a range of adventure activities, including canoeing, and as they will be having some use of our site this year, I thought some background on who they are, and what they will be doing would be useful.

WOEC are part of the Education Department of Dorset County Council, and run sailing, canoeing, climbing and other adventure activities, both for schools and adults. We have used WOEC ourselves, e.g. for Cadet and instructor training.

WOEC's main base is at Knightsdale Road, Weymouth. However, they have used the Sandsfoot site for canoe training for a number of years, and they have asked if they could continue to do so, which we have agreed to. It is vital that we generate extra income to cover the extra costs of the new site (mortgage, etc), and, like increasing membership and winter keelboat storage, the income from WOEC is an essential part of this. Are you RYA Powerboat level 2 qualified and might want to use a Club boat this season? Joe Isaacs (and friends) are running a Club boats experience evening

on Monday 3rd March 7.30pm in the Clubhouse. Invaluable information and training to improve skills, safety techniques and to ensure our boats are looked after.

Come along and get your CBE! If you are interested give me a ring as we need to know numbers and it is likely the evening will be run again if this Monday doesn't suit.

WOEC will run canoeing courses from April through to December, with courses on Thursday evenings and Saturday and Sunday mornings, mainly for small groups, and some other canoeing activities some weekdays. They will have the use of the press office and store (the first door downstairs on the right as you go down the steps), access to the changing rooms and showers, and they will be putting up a canoe rack on the hardstanding for their canoes. Canoeing students will come to the site in the WOEC minibus, which should limit pressure on parking. They will not run training when we have big Open Meetings on.

BACK TO THE FUTURE

The team working on the installation of one of the new splendid notice boards were Mike Venning, Eric Barnes and Brian Wilkins. In a lighter moment they decided to put a Time Capsule (sheet of paper) at the back of the board, stating the date and the fact that this gang's combined association with Castle Cove Sailing Club spans more than 170 years.

We have received a donation from Ann Bryers in memory of her father Alec Palmer who with his wife Nora were long time members of our Club. Alec was the official Course Officer for a number of years. That was when we only had three buoys; two somewhere near the start line and one close to Whitehead's pier. The rest of the marks used were the existing Admiralty mooring buoys or the torpedo target rafts. On other mark was used on rare occasions our boats went outside the breakwaters. This was the sewerage outfall buoy off the Stone Pier – sometimes sailing through this area provided most interesting views and aromas!! Fortunately this was a time when capsizes were rare. Good job really as lots of members could not swim – including Alec and his daughter Ann. No Safety Boats. No Lifejackets – in fact only a few had oilskins.

Alec later ran the Ferrybridge Boatyard, where some of our boats were laid up. All work there was handrolic. Block and tackle, levers, wedges, big hammers, a fixed hand turned winch with two gears and the careful use of Spring tides. No wonder that Alec and his motley crew of helpers rushed to enjoy a pint or two at the Ferry Bridge pub when it opened at noon. This pub was also used for some of our Club's social functions. Joan and I both have very special memories of Alec because he took us from the church to our wedding reception in Gay Lady – the boat that was used for Club ferrying.

RECRUITING NEW MEMBERS

Our Club is comprised of a wonderfully diverse range of people who all have at heart a love for sailing and, we hope, the sense of kinship that a small and thriving association can bring. One of the things that everyone agreed upon when discussing the move to Sandsfoot was that the ethos of friendship, contribution and active participation in Club activities should not be lost. At the same time it was recognised that our new home has capacity to extend the membership and, indeed, a 10% increase in membership would help to keep membership fees steady. During the months of September to February there have been about 6% more applications for membership than in previous years so we are moving in the right direction. For both recruitment and good public relations, Jacqui Gisborne is organising an Open Day on May 11th and we, all of us, need to encourage new membership.

This note is to remind members that we can all promote the Club and encourage new members. The following guidelines are designed to help you give advice to your friends and acquaintances, whether existing sailors or aspiring sailors, on joining Castle Cove SC.

Eligibility

- The Club welcomes new members who wish to sail in single-hulled boats whose primary means of propulsion is wind power.
- Inexperienced sailors will be welcomed; complete novices are recommended to take a course with WOEC or other reputable sailing schools before using CCSC facilities.
- Age rules for cadets are given in the Club Handbook.
- As long as at least one member of any family is an active participator in sailing, other family members will be welcome in the Club (subject to normal rules).
- New Club members are encouraged to sail preferred classes (Sigma 33, J24, B14, 29er, Buzz, Wayfarer, Contender, Scorpion, Laser, Topper, Mirror & Optimist)

- At the last AGM it was agreed that the 30-mile domiciliary rule could be viewed as a guide rather than
 be applied strictly and thus prospective members who live some distance from the Club must
 demonstrate (as do all members) that they will actively support the Club by doing at least one duty (tea,
 rescue, OD, AOD etc), help from time to time with duties for Open Meetings and make a contribution to
 Club maintenance (this may be anything from winter working parties to administration). Those living at
 a distance with a boat on a mooring must be able to respond quickly if something untoward happens to
 the boat (e.g., mooring failure).
- Obviously all other Club rules apply.

Club advantages

Liz Grant, the Membership Secretary, or any member of the Committee will be please to talk with prospective members. Most applicants come to the Club to look round. SEPTEMBER

CANARIES TO THE CARIBBEAN WITH NEIL AND JOSIE PRINCE ON LUCY ELLEN

Ian Cheke and I flew out to Tenerife on Friday 15th November. Lucy Ellen was almost fully provisioned except for the last minute fresh stuff. We helped Neil to check the rigging and engine and generally get the boat ready. The plan was to leave for Antigua the following Tuesday in company with three other larger yachts. We slipped our berth at 1100 on Tuesday 15th November - there was a fanfare of hooters and horns from friends we had made during our stay. The GPS was indicating 2700 nm to our waypoint off Antigua! This we all found quite daunting and too many Cherbourg crossings to calculate. The first week we sailed due South in search of the trade winds. The winds were generally light but from all directions, this was good as we were able to get our sea legs and establish a routine. It took us almost a week and 800 miles before the butter started to melt and we turned right to head for Antigua. The trade winds were exactly what we all expected, 15 to 20 knots from the East, bright blue skies with puffy clouds and beautiful turquoise sea. There was however a very lumpy cross swell which made life very uncomfortable for us on Lucy Ellen. Despite this, Josie still produced a gourmet meal every night. We had the genoa poled out to port and a small storm gib hanked on to an emergency forestay poled out to starboard. With this sail plan we managed 6kts for most of the time, and if a squall came, and many did, we simply rolled in some genoa to reduce sail. Neil, Ian and I were keeping watches on the helm 2 hours on and 4 off. Josie kept a standing 1000 to 1200 watch in the forenoon which gave us an extra 2 hours off every day. The sail plan and the watch system worked well and we very quickly slipped into the routine. Neil baked lovely fresh bread every other day and even lan managed to read two books. I taught Josie how to play cribbage and it wasn't long before she was beating me. Every thing stopped at 1800 for sundowners. We saw lots of flying fish and dolphins, but only two other yachts. One particular day we had two 30 foot whales come and play with the boat. They would surf down a wave from astern and then when abreast of the boat would turn upside down and swim under the keel showing their white bellies. They seemed to enjoy this, as they stayed with the boat all afternoon and well into the

night. During the night we could identify some of the common stars and constellations, we saw many shooting stars and when the moon was full, the night watches were unforgettable. We caught 4 fish, two got away but two we ate for dinner. The other three larger yachts all had SSB transmitters and reported their position to each other every day. We had receive only and could earwig their conversations, so we could plot their position, but they didn't know ours. The GPS directed us right to Antigua despite there being 18° of variation! We arrived at English Harbour at 1400 on Monday 9th December, 20 days after leaving the Canaries. Ian and I flew home on Friday 13th December. Neil and Josie are still cruising the Caribbean; they stayed in Antigua over Christmas and were last heard of from Guadeloupe before heading South toward Grenada. FROM BRISTOL CLIPPER

At the end of January, we had just passed through the Doldrums and were storming along in the northeast trade winds towards Hawaii, in 3rd place.

We're now mid Pacific again, en route from Hawaii to Yokohama, but more of that later. The remaining 1500 miles to Hawaii were a bit of a drag run. Going in a straight line, these boats are incredibly evenly matched. Thus, there was very little change in relative position day by day. However, we had slightly more current on our line, than London Clipper further to the north, and were able to pull in to 2nd place. However, that still left Jersey, some 30 miles ahead, on roughly the same track as us. Every 12 hours, we have a radio sched, when the duty Clipper collects the positions of all the boats to send them to the race office. Sched by sched, there might be a mile or two gain or loss between us and Jersey, but not enough for us to get ahead.

However, as we got closer to Hawaii, the weather became more unsettled and squally and it was possible to make much bigger gains or losses, depending on how much you got caught under squall clouds. One sched, having made our way to 21 miles behind Jersey, we then lost 12 miles on the next sched, before we then had a good couple of scheds and they found the clouds and suddenly we were only 4 miles behind, with only 400 miles to go. A few hours later, we even had them in sight, on our starboard bow, the first Clipper for two weeks.

Jersey and Bristol were on strangely different courses, so we quickly lost sight of each other, but over the next day or so, maintained a distance to go within a mile or two of each other. As we got closer to the Hawaiian islands, the reason for the different courses became apparent as Jersey picked a different route through the islands to us. Initially, this appeared to pay off as the current helped them on their route and we lost the wind, but then the northeast trades recovered, leaving them in the lee of Maui and us with clear wind, allowing us to storm towards the finish. This was visible to web watchers at home, but it wasn't until the radio sched, 3 hours before we finished that we discovered we had turned an 18 mile deficit in to 30 mile lead. We won the race, with Liverpool 2nd and Jersey 3rd, leaving us in 3rd place overall, one point behind London in 2nd.

Our first victory took a while in coming, but was very welcome to my crew and around the fleet. Prizegivings are always more fun when you are the winners. There were two in Hawaii!

We had a great break in Oahu, with some of the crew going off to Maui for a few days. I had a couple of visitors for a few days, my sister-in-law Jane, and a surprise visitor in the form of Dave Caddy, who unexpectedly turned up at the airport. We rented a studio flat the other side of the island and chilled out for a few days.

10 days ago, we set off on the next race to Japan. The route takes us west in the trade winds before heading up to Japan. We are currently in 5th place, as we have chosen to keep further south than most of the other boats in order to get better wind and current. Being further south means that with the same westing, we would have a greater distance to go to Japan. In practise, we are actually slightly further west and the plan is to move back up in front of the rest of the fleet. We'll see in a few days if this tactic has been successful.

Best wishes to all of you back in Blighty as you think about getting boats ready for the new season. Boozeroo will be heading up to the Solent for the summer to compete in the RORC offshore series and the Fastnet race.

Following a week in Japan, we will then be off to Shanghai in China.
