Included in this list of charges for 2005 is a special rate for Castle Cove Members who keep their boats in Weymouth but who sail in the Harbour.

Concessionary Port and Harbour Dues for small vessels from 1st January 2005

TARIFF

The following Port and Harbour Dues are applicable to recreational vessels, workboats, fishing vessels, floating pontoons and pleasure craft for hire, less than 24 metres in length (small vessels).

A separate charging regime will apply to commercial and trading vessels and those which are not small vessels and Personal Water Craft (PWC).

SAFETY BOAT TRAINING

It is proving increasingly difficult to provide sufficient safety cover during races and we need to enlarge the pool of qualified members.

Training is provided by the Sea Cadets, it runs over two days over a weekend and has a maximum of four delegates per course. The cost is £70 of which the Club pays £35, providing you make yourself available for safety boat cover, sometimes at short notice.

To do the RYA Safety Boat Course, you must be an experienced driver and have the RYA Level 2 Powerboat Certificate. It can be physically demanding so you must be fit.
