A new experience - travelling to a dinghy event

Many club members are experienced racers who compete regularly around the country. However lots like me enjoy our local racing but have not plucked up courage to travel. I don't want to discourage local participation but thought I'd share with you briefly my first experience of travelling to a big event (Laser Masters at Stokes Bay).

1. It wasn't nearly as nerve wracking as I thought, there were lots of competitors of mixed abilities although of course there were some very good sailors too (including Steve Cockerill)

2. Don't be put off by the contingent of hardened travellers, for every one of them there are two nonseasoned travellers. Its worth noting people who seem to be racing /finishing close to you as they are always up for a chat and welcome the ice-breaking

It's really interesting to race against different people for a change and in different waters. Set yourself a target (eg not last; close to half way up the fleet; etc) and be happy with the good things.

We had a terrible lack of wind (21 – 23 July) so only 4 races over 3 days, the club arranged everything quite well, but not as well as CCSC. The jamming session on Saturday night (sax and 5 guitars including Steve C) was an excellent way of rounding off the day but the tally/penalties monitoring, trolley dollies was WAY short of what we offer and starts were always late.

Stokes Bay is well known for producing champion sailors, their role of honour board is extensive (and includes Ben Ainslie) so their youngsters have lots of role models. My admiration for Steve C has increased, he really does put back a lot into his club and is clearly very popular there. Clearly such role models would be an asset at CCSC. However their waters don't begin to compare with ours, tides, winds, shipping, wakes, steep shingle launching with on-shore prevailing winds and rarely windward start lines – APPRECI-ATE WHAT WE HAVE FOLKS. I heard other travellers saying how lucky they are, we are even luckier.

Folks – get sailing – we are the luckiest sailors almost anywhere, we should show our appreciation more. And do try travelling from time to time – its not as daunting as you would think.

SECURITY NOTE

As part of the effort to discourage thieves, vandals and trespassers from the Club site please note that black "anti vandal" paint has been applied to several key and vulnerable points on our boundary. It is recommended by the Police.

The Ultimate

I know that racing is really important to the club and sometimes I know that a few of the boats that don't race feel a little "left out" so try this for a little inspiration....

Come down to the club on a Friday evening: the ferry is running so there is no real need for a tender. Sleeping on my boat on a Friday evening adds what seems to be a complete day on to my weekend. If you like bring something to cook.... my favourite has to be Moules Mariniere.... cook a little onion in butter.... add some white wine heat and then add the mussels, put a lid on the pan and give it a shake, after just a few minutes the mussels should be cooked, add a handful of chopped parsley.... now this is the good bit... eat the mussels directly from the pan... chuck the shells over board... (good recycling) and then mop up the wonderful juices with a great chunk of French bread (saves on a lot of washing up!).

I am lucky in the morning: I motor up to the pier, have a shower (after putting on the water for an extra hour's heating - control is in the servery) and then motor back to the mooring for breakfast.

If the wind is kind, sail across to Man o' War Cove (to the east of Durdle Door) it must be one of the most beautiful anchorages in the South of England.... you enter at the largest gap between the two most westerly rocks and then make a sharp turn to port after you have entered. The water must be about 12 ft deep (although I have not checked it) this is not a problem to Pimpernel as we only draw 2ft 6". There is rarely anyone in the cove and I love it! So much more peaceful than Lulworth and without the swell. The ultimate place to say along the Dorset coast.
