Dear Commodore,

Proposed Extension to the Clubhouse Verandah

The recent update for the proposed new extension to the club house was most welcome as to date there has been very little information released to the general membership. However, it must be pointed out that the limited detail given raises certain questions that need to be answered satisfactorily. For this reason the General Committee decision to call a General Meeting to discuss the proposals is very sensible. We have consulted the CCSC Hon. Solicitor, and until this meeting takes place and members are completely satisfied that the proposals and large expenditure are in the best interest of the club, we believe that the Committee could be in contravention of club rule 9.10.2.

It must be said right from the outset that the income raising to date has been commendable and the thanks of the general membership must go to the General, Forward Planning and Strategy committees for the planning and execution of this success. The club will expect to see a tangible legacy for the future and this income will certainly contribute towards achieving that goal.

It is felt however that there are several areas that should be examined before the club goes too far down the road to total commitment. These could be summarised under the headings of

Budgetary Building Reality Club ethos

This open letter to you addresses views expressed by some active members of the club under these headings. We feel that it is our responsibility to promote these concerns to not only you, the General Committee and Trustees, but also to those members who, for whatever reason, have not been fully appraised of recent planning and thinking.

Budgetary

Financial risk – If £200,000 is spent on Stage One now, what will be the projected position of the Club in 2013? What is the expectation from corporate activity? How will plans be adjusted if this income does not reach expectation in the current economic climate?

What is the club's current financial position, what loans does the club have? (a detailed financial breakdown is required) Can it be confirmed that all the income generated from the Olympic training scheme is exempt from Tax?

How much scrutiny has been exercised in choosing the best commercial design option, bearing in mind that at least 3 South Coast Sailing Club committees have gone ahead with awarding build contracts without first ensuring that the membership is fully aware of the financial implications?

Building Reality

Have money saving options in terms of design specification been fully scrutinised and if so what has been identified? Detailed tender plans should be made publicly available before commitment to contractors. There is a professional Architect in the Club who can help with this at no cost. Interested user groups can then assure themselves that expectations will be realised.

If Stage One goes ahead this winter what security provision will be made for the storage area under the verandah prior to Stage Two?

Club Ethos

The first Rule of the club is:

The object of the club shall be the furtherance of the sport of sailing in the locality.

The General Committee should have this foremost in their minds when making decisions that involve committing large amounts of funding on a single project. There is concern that the clubhouse extension, whilst agreed in principle, should not be allowed to swallow up too large a financial proportion due to ambitious design over and above the functional level. Other clubs have spent too much on grand facilities and their sailing activities have suffered as a result.

There are other important projects that further the sport of sailing and benefit members. Some examples of which are:

A club crane that can be self financing and has so many uses.

The ability to lift club support boats into the water so that winter dinghy sailing is not dependent on Safety Boats based in Weymouth Marina - savings in any potential levy of marina fees, members time and fuel. The swift launch and recovery of Club Boats for cleaning and maintenance, both routine and in emergency.

The lift in/out of masts and mooring sinkers.

A new committee boat that is self powered and can be moved easily around the harbour. Complete with a power windlass, it will greatly improve racing options.

A proper storage facility to increase efficiency and security for the moorings committee - resulting in more uncluttered space

immediately in front of the club.

A significant upgrade in ventilation, lighting and overall refurbishment of the Club changing rooms.

Completion of the boundary security fence to a uniform high standard.

There are many more, but it is considered that a relatively modest expenditure on a number of smaller items will have a much more beneficial result for the members than a massive spend on a very large balcony.

In conclusion, we all want the best for the club as a whole. In order to achieve this we feel that the membership must be able to understand how and where their money is being spent.

The present situation is that although nearly all members are in favour of an extended balcony, very, very few are aware of the true cost. They also know that almost the main purpose of the balcony is to provide cover for storage and boat maintenance, but again are unaware that there is not enough money to fully complete this.

The members are aware that Olympic Teams can function quite satisfactorily with the present facilities, so there is no imperative to rush into a balcony build this winter. The General Committee is therefore requested to present to the Extra General Meeting, a full and detailed explanation of their plans, and other options which could be adopted. In particular, they will need to explain the financial risks which such a large expenditure on a single part of a project may have on the long term finances and facilities of the Club.

OLYMPIC VOLUNTEERING

Folks - this is my personal take on volunteering for the Olympics: I was put off by Sail for Gold, but I think things are improving:

By demonstrating our support for the Olympics, we believe that we can help to achieve a lasting legacy (2012 **and beyond**) for the area by showing our knowledge and experience in these waters. **If we don't sign up now, we risk missing opportunities, and we can always turn down offers we don't like!**

The website for volunteering for the Olympics in 2012 **is live until 27 October**. Rob Andrews (LOCOG member responsible for sailing) has corrected the misapprehension that the only job for local volunteers is car parking attendant! He met YCW Commodores in August and went to some lengths to assure us that there will be good roles for local volunteers; for example, they will need RIB drivers as marshals and to drive the press; an excellent means of getting close to the action. Also needed are foreign language interpreters and first aiders.

Feedback on the support that we have offered visiting teams this season has been very positive and we shall continue to support the various teams in the run-up period. However, as we know, the teams will be subject to considerable security restrictions during the event itself. Although we have been reassured that our Club racing can continue whilst the Olympics are in progress, this may be difficult if conditions cause races to run into the evenings; thus volunteering during the event is likely to be the best way of being involved.
