

# Fun Stuff - Sailing Dictionary Part 1

If the words associated with sailing are a complete mystery to you, read on to find no help whatsoever:

#### **Ahoy**

The first in a series of four letter words commonly exchanged by skippers as their boats approach one another

#### Bar

Long. Low lying navigational hazard, usually awash, found at river mouths and harbour entrances, where it is composed of sand or mud, and ashore, where it is made of mahogany or some other dark wood. Sailors can be found in large numbers around both.

#### Boom

A Laterally mounted spar to which a sail is fastened, used during gybing to shift crew members to a fixed, horizontal position.

#### **Bulkhead**

Discomfort suffered by sailors who drink too much

#### Cabin

A cramped, closet like compartment below decks where crew members may be stored – on their sides if large or on end if small – until needed.

#### Calm

Sea condition characterised by the simultaneous disappearance of the wind and the last cold beer

#### Channel

Narrow stretch of deep or dredged waterway bordered by buoys or markers that separates two or more grounded boats

#### Current

Tidal flow that carries a boat away from it's desired destination or towards a hazard.

#### **Fitting Out**

Series of maintenance tasks performed on boats ashore during good weather weekends in spring and summer months to make them ready for winter storage.

#### Flipper

Rubber swimming aid worn on the feet. Usually available in two sizes, 3 and 17

#### **Flotsam**

Anything floating in the water from which there is no response when an offer of a cocktail is made.

#### Fluke

The portion of an anchor that digs securely into the bottom: also, any occasion when this happens on the first try.



#### Galley

Ancient: Aspect of seafaring associated with slavery. Modern: Aspect of seafaring associated with slavery

#### Gear

Generic term for any pieces of boating equipment that can be forgotten in the back-seat or boot of a car, left behind on a pontoon, soaked in the bottom of a dinghy or lost over the side of the boat.

#### **Gimbals**

Movable mountings often found on shipboards lamps, compasses etc which provide dieting passengers an opportunity to observe the true motions of the ship in relation to them, and thus prevent any recently ingested food from remaining in their digestive systems long enough to be converted into unwanted calories.

#### Grounding

Embarrassing situation in which a sailor returns to shore without leaving his boat.

## **CHERBOURG RACE**

Saturday 28th May 2011

Organised by Castle Cove Sailing Club - Open to all Yacht Clubs of Weymouth

#### SAILING INSTRUCTIONS AND INFORMATION

- 1. **Entry**: The race is organised by CCSC and is open to all yachts from YCW clubs. Entrants must have an approved CCSC or YCW handicap.
- 2. **Rules**: The Race will be governed by the Rules as defined in the ISAF Racing Rules of Sailing 2010/11, the RYA prescriptions & the byelaws of the Weymouth and Portland Borough Council and Portland Port harbour authority and as specified in the Notice of Race.
- 3. Starting Time: 07.05 BST. Warning signal not before 07.00 BST
- 4. **Race Flag:** Competitors are requested to fly the 'E' flag from the backstay during the race.
- 5. **Course:** From the CCSC Start Line in Portland Harbour to Cherbourg Harbour (Western Entrance)
- 6. **First/turning mark.** A CCSC racing buoy may be nominated as a first turning mark, if so the mark and direction of rounding will be indicated on the committee boat.
- 7. **Finish:** Cherbourg Western Entrance in the Passe L'Ouest on the imaginary line bearing 260 degrees true from the light FI(3) WR15s, on Fort de L'Ouest. Cross from North to South.
- 8. **Finishing Times:** Competitors must time themselves over the finishing line using an accurate watch (or time from GPS) in BST. Times should be recorded to the nearest second.
- 9. **Time limit:** Time limit for the race is 24 hours
- 10. **Declarations**. Must be made on the official form and presented to the nominated CCSC representative at Cherbourg by 09.00 BST on Sunday. If a yacht retires from the race the skipper should inform the Race Organisers. Contact information is given below.
- 11. **Postponement:** In the event of conditions unsuitable for a safe Channel crossing a decision may be taken by the organisers to postpone the race.
- 12. **Safety:** The safety of a yacht and her entire management, including insurance, shall be the sole responsibility of the owner/person in charge who must ensure that the yacht & her crew are adequate to face the conditions that may arise in the course of the race. Yachts must carry a VHF radio & it is recommended that they meet ISAF Cat.3 or ISO Cat.B standards.
- 13. Use of Engines: Engines may be used from 30 minutes after the start but for not more than two thirds of the passage duration. A penalty of twice the time under engine will be added to the overall passage time to give the elapsed time. Competitors using engine assistance will not be eligible for first place award.
- **14. Protests:** Any protests must be delivered to the CCSC representative by 09.00 hrs on Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> May 2011. A protest committee may be convened either in Cherbourg or in the UK.
- 15. Contact information: During the passage to Cherbourg competitors are advised to keep a listening watch on VHF Ch 72 (in addition to Ch 16). Routine inter-ship calls should be made on Ch 72.
