Notes to help you enjoy the sailing programme at Castle Cove

Racing

The Sailing programme has races for dinghies and for keelboats. Boats are split into different classes to help with organisation and to try to ensure everyone has the chance to experience competitive racing. **The Dinghy Classes** are:

- Asymmetric dinghies: It is the sail that is asymmetric (not the boat!), specifically the foresail and this class includes dinghies like the 2000 and Musto Performance Skiff
- Class 1 dinghies: generally, dinghies that are slower and the Class includes dinghies like Mirrors and Toppers
- Class 2 dinghies: generally faster dinghies and the Class includes dinghies like Scorpions and Contenders
- Some dinghies may sail in a class of their own, like the Laser, and although they start with another class (the Lasers share a start with Class 1 dinghies) most of the time they have their own set of trophies to race for
- Class 9 is for when all of the separate classes of dinghy sail together.

You can find the details of classes and boats, the individual race starts, and the trophies available in the Club handbook.

At Castle Cove, because we have few one class fleets, dinghies race using Portsmouth Yardstick Numbers (PYN) which, in theory, means any boat has the chance to win a race if it is sailed well enough. The PYN is used as a multiplication factor to change the actual time taken to complete a race to a 'corrected time'. The boat with the shortest 'corrected time' wins the race and is given 1 point for the race. The boat with the second shortest 'corrected time' is given 2 points, and so on. The points are added up during a series of races to produce the series winner.

We have the following Race Series for dinghies:

Sunday mornings at around 10.30 (two races back to back - see the handbook for dates and actual start times)

Spring Series (8 races), 1st Sunday Series (6 races), 2nd Sunday Series (6 races), 3rd Sunday Series (6 races)

Monday evenings at around 18.30 (see handbook for details)

1st Monday (6 races), 2nd Monday (6 races), 3rd Monday (6 races) and Late Summer Monday Series (4 Races)

Wednesday evenings at around 18.30 (see handbook for details) 1st Wednesday (6 races), 2nd Wednesday (6 races), 3rd Wednesday (6 Races) and Late Summer Wednesday (4 races)

The Race Officer will set a shorter course (usually a shorter beat) whenever there is a Class 1 or Laser start.

The Keelboat Classes are:

- Class 3 for faster keelboats
- Class 4 for slower Keelboats
- When all of the keelboats race together they are known as Z Class

Currently we have no individual keelboat classes (types of boat) that have enough numbers to have a start on their own.

Keelboat racing takes place on Monday and Wednesday evenings at about the same time as the dinghy races but they have their own start times. (See the Club handbook for details)

Sunday morning keelboat racing takes place in Weymouth Bay together with boats from Weymouth Sailing Club. There is self-organised cruiser racing on Friday evenings when this is arranged. (Look out for notices by email and on the club notice boards)

Results for keelboats are calculated in the same way as they are for dinghies. Corrected times are calculated by multiplying the actual (elapsed) time by a 'rating' or a 'handicap' number to find who has the shortest 'corrected' time. This year we are trying a handicap system based on the National Handicap for Cruisers (NHC), though we have changed it to produce 'club numbers' for each boat that will only change at the end of each series (not after each race as required by NHC). Keelboats may also race under the IRC rating system, which assigns an absolute rating to each boat. An annual certificate is required to race under IRC and must be provided to the Sailing Committee Results Officer before the start of any series.

Cup Races

Through the sailing season there are occasional Cup and other race events which are often short series in their own right. Details can be found in the handbook and some events, such as the Pursuit and Passage Races, will have their own set of Sailing Instructions issued closer to the time.

Cruising

Our keelboats have a very active sailing programme that should suit beginners and the more experienced alike. The cruising programme is outlined in the Club handbook and a separate booklet is available in the club house.

Improving and gaining confidence

One of the benefits of being part of a sailing club is the opportunity to improve skills by taking part in organised events and learn from those with more experience, and by being able to learn from mistakes made in a safe environment. This happens over time through taking part in the racing programme, going cruising, helping on race teams and just pottering around the club.

We have 8 Saturday afternoons planned through June, July and August, which will provide specific opportunities to gain confidence on the water in dinghies and on keelboats in a safe and friendly environment. The Sail4All programme is being developed, so look out for more information and details of who to contact.

Just messing about

We encourage free sailing (i.e. without safety boat cover), sailing in small groups, sailing as a family, and all the on-water activities available because of our access to the harbour and bay. Club events are overseen by experienced members who are able to call on even more experienced members if there is any doubt about conditions and whether an event should go ahead. When making these decisions for yourself you must take just as much care.

- Always wear adequate clothing including a buoyancy aid if you are dinghy sailing
- Make sure your boat is in good shape
- Have a means of communication and keep within your limits
- Do not rely on others coming to your rescue

Offshore winds (northerly/north westerly from the club) can be deceptive; calm close the shore but they may become strong and blow you away from the club as you pass through the moorings.

Exonerate, Exonerate - The Daleks are coming

Rules are usually not much fun but it is also not much fun (for someone) when we don't keep to them. When sailing we have the Collision Regs, which apply whenever we are on the water, and the Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS) which apply when we race. Failing to keep to the Collision Regs can have severe consequences. Failing to keep to the RRS can now have less severe consequences thanks to the introduction of the Exoneration Penalty.

In brief, incidents that might have led to a full protest hearing can now be resolved by the boat realising they are in the wrong accepting the 'Exoneration Penalty', which is less than disqualification, and settles the matter. This would not be available to a boat causing injury or serious damage.

When there is an incident that will not result in the lodging of a protest, or a request for redress, a boat may request an advisory hearing and notify any boat involved in the incident. An Advisor will then call a hearing to learn what may have happened and will state whether any rule appears to have been broken, and by which boat. As a result, a boat may accept an Exoneration Penalty when it applies to the incident, or may choose to retire.

This is a new process for the Club and we hope that it will be one way in which we all better understand the rules and improve the quality of our racing.

Being an Advisor is open to all Club members with a reasonable grasp of the RRS. Please contact the Sailing Secretary if you are interested in learning more about being an Advisor.

Full details of the Exoneration/Advisory Hearing process will be available on the Club Notice board.

CCSC Cadets

CCSC Cadets is available to all children covered by a family membership. We meet every Friday night from 5.30 p.m. The length of the session is weather-dependent, but we aim to be launched by 6.30 p.m. and back in by 8 p.m. Generally, members bring food and use the bbq or kitchen facilities for meals after.

We do please ask that parents are at the club for the duration of the session and are available to help with launching and recovery of the sailors.

Cadets cater for sailors aged 8 to 17.

We have a CCSC Cadet Facebook group where we also post information. If you are not already a member and would like to be please contact us via ccsccadets@gmail.com. The Facebook group is closed as we regularly post photos of the groups.

Land Day

This year we are asking that all potential cadets please come to Land Day to sign up. Due to the popularity of CCSC Cadets, only cadets who are signed up, and on our register, will be able to sail on Friday nights. For safety reasons there is a limit to the number of children we can take on the water. Once we are full, we are full and we will not be able to accommodate any more. So, to ensure you have a place, please make sure you are at the club for land day on

14th April at 10.30am

in addition to registration, there will be activities and the opportunity to speak with us about the coming season.

Friday Nights

Sessions start with Registration from 5.30 p.m.

Following this will be a short briefing from the sailors' coaches with their groups. Launching will start from 6.15 p.m. and will be in specific group order.

Recovery will then commence in reverse order, with the idea being that trolleys are all in the right place! We hope!

Once all boats are derigged and away, there will be the opportunity for coaches to

have a quick word with their group if needed, then they will be able to get changed and eat!

Coaching groups will be designated either at or following Land Day and will be based on a mix of ability and age.

Optimist Training

We are once again running our successful Optimist Training sessions.


